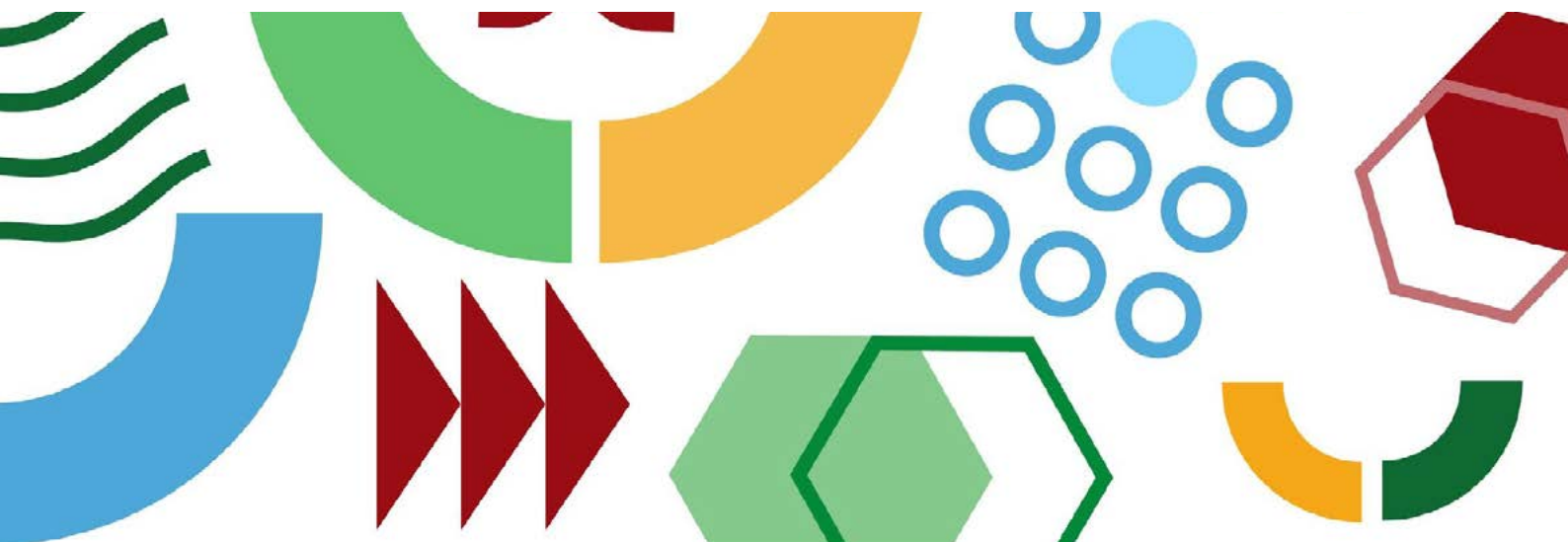

RESMYLE Field Training Workshops

The RESMYLE project aims to rethink the employment and social integration of young people in the Mediterranean through sustainable development.

3 areas of intervention have been chosen: awareness-raising, training and entrepreneurship.

After raising awareness on the environment and sustainable development, by and for young people through the 11 granted projects and a webportal of resources called **Act4urplanet.eu** – the second step was to train the young people.

To achieve this, RESMYLE first developed 15 field training workshops on the environment and sustainable development, then some ecomissions of 3 months in different types of organisations were done by the young people.

RESMYLE offered 180 young people the opportunity to take part in 15 on-the-job training workshops, each lasting 15 days and focusing on a theme and problem defined by local residents. The aim was to find solutions and try to implement them. In this ebook, you'll find details of each workshop.

The concept of RESMYLE international practical field training workshop

The international practical field training workshop is an experience that enables young people to become aware of sustainable development and to acquire transversal and professional skills by supporting local initiatives. Inspired by the project-based learning approach, it is a revelatory process in which young people discover values and learning outcomes such as:

Learning by doing - Designed as a pedagogical training tool based on field experience, the workshop offers participants a 15-day “learning by doing” experience in a non-formal context.

Solidarity - The workshop also offers know-how on a voluntary basis for a given territory that responds to a local need, promoting the concept of active participation.

An intercultural adventure - Aimed at young people from different countries, inviting them to address local issues in a different country with a different culture, the workshop promotes European and intercultural citizenship.

Social skills - The workshop offers the opportunity to acquire team-working skills in an intercultural context, developing emotional, relational and cognitive skills such as self-awareness, sustainable relationships, problem-solving, decision-making and creative thinking.

Moreover, for local actors, the workshop represents an opportunity to enthusiastically reinforce local sustainable development projects, making them dynamic through the participation of young people.

The workshop can be a valuable complement to the local project in several ways:

As a trigger: prior to the local project, it can help identify fundamental problems and act accordingly in the project.

As a stimulator: within an existing local project, the workshop can revive or support a new dynamic and/or refocus the project itself.

As a mediator: in several cases, the workshop takes place in a context of local obstacles. By bringing a different, outside viewpoint to the table, young people can, among other things, revitalize the project and help it reach consensus with local partners.


In this sense, the practical field training workshop gives territories a helping hand. It is made up of an international team of 12 young people who are neither students, nor in employment or training (NEET).

Participants are selected by local event organizers in RESMYLE countries (France, Italy, Jordan, Lebanon, Tunisia).

Participants work together for two weeks under the supervision of local professionals and follow an educational program. This program enables participants to experience and collect the learning results themselves, through their voluntary contribution.

The team, made up of volunteers, is placed in a professional situation. The workshop hinge on a central theme of sustainable territorial development. Volunteers are involved in local projects linked to the protection and enhancement of natural and cultural resources, eco-development, natural risk prevention, sustainable tourism, etc.

The team settles into a territory and, thanks to this approach, the workshop teaches young people about sustainable development, as well as important skills that will enable them to behave as

adults in our society. These skills include: communication and public speaking, organization and time management, research and inquiry, self-evaluation and reflection, teamwork and leadership, and critical thinking.

The workshop does not consist of in vitro training exercises; on the contrary, everything takes place in situ, in the field. The geographical and socio-economic particularities of the various European and Mediterranean territories, together with their heritage, their strengths and weaknesses, always provide the working framework of the initiative.

The experience objectives, be they restoration or enhancement, are always focused both on territorial interests and local inhabitants, with particular attention to sustainable development and the learning impact on participants. The territory also provides the environment in which the young people live for two weeks. It offers them accommodation, food, local festivals and events, as well as time to share with the local population.

Local organizers of the international practical field training workshop and their technical partners:

RESMYLE partners, with the support of local associations, authorities and local development organizations, have organized 15 workshops between September 2021 and July 2023. Each workshop is aimed at (possibly separately):

1. NEETS with a low level of education and looking for a job.
2. NEETS who have graduated and are looking for work.

Local organizers present an issue which is analyzed by RESMYLE coordinators (AMESCI & CDE Petra Patrimonia).

Some examples of projects:

- Discovery and restoration of old water roads, Malemort du Comtat, France
- Preservation of a natural wetland sensitive to pollution (Sebkhet Soliman RAMSAR site and ZICO), Tunisia
- Waste warriors in Qana villages: Creating waste management games, Lebanon

- Assessing the accessibility of public spaces, Jordan
- Enhancing and preventing fire in a natural forest ecosystem, Tunisia
- Terra, the future as a cultural horizon, Italy
- Planning a gastronomic experience in Northern Jordan
- Designing a cultural and tourist circuit in the Medina of Hammamet, Tunisia

Local organizers prepare a proposal document (see next section - Workshop formulation), identifying the issue to which the workshop is devoted and the conditions under which it will take place, so that applicants can be informed.

They make the final selection of candidates. The local organization takes care of all logistical aspects of the practical field training workshop, such as accommodation, workspaces, materials and the provision of any educational information concerning the project or the local area, preparation of the work program, welcoming the young people, scientific supervision, etc. Finally, they invite local experts to develop the work program.

Formulation of the practical field training workshop:

The key point is to respond to a local need/problem and, at the same time, create a training workshop.

When formulating their projects, the organizations responsible for the workshop should define the following points:

1. Geographical location of the workshop,
2. Description of the local project to be covered by the workshop,
3. Workshop theme,
4. Workshop title,
5. Training objectives and local project objectives,
6. Expected results for local projects, partners and participants,
7. Brief description of workshop events,
8. General information about the organization hosting the workshop,
9. General information on the organization responsible for developing and supervising the workshop (very often the same as in point 8),
10. Names of the people in the organization responsible for the workshop and the people in charge of supervising it,
11. Anticipated profile of participant groups (number, age, status: NEET, training skills, previous experience),
12. Planned duration (2 weeks),
13. Outline work plan.



Title: Design of a guide to the ordinary built heritage of the town of Hammamet

Venue: Hammamet (Tunisia)

Date: 5th to 19th september 2021

Hosting organization: AERE - Association d'Education Relative à l'Environnement

The workshop supports and enhances the ongoing discussions at the municipality of Hammamet regarding the revision of the city's urban development plan. The data from the inventory of ordinary built heritage can be utilized in urban planning documents (identifying elements to preserve and enhance). This workshop addresses the following issues:

- Lack of knowledge about this heritage
- State of abandonment and degradation
- No available inventory
- Lack of valorization

The main outcomes of this workshop included the development of a selective inventory of heritage, the production of communication materials, and the creation of a **guide for the ordinary built heritage of Hammamet**. The result was of high quality, showcased in an exhibition with 18 panels, each focusing on a different building from both a historical and architectural perspective, presented in an artistically professional manner. The texts in Arabic and French are accompanied by photos and illustrations, including pen sketches, watercolors, and drawings.

In addition to the professional and technical skills acquired, the workshop provided participants with insights into vernacular architecture, the environment, painting, photography and videography, field survey techniques, inventory creation, translation, collaborative work, conflict resolution, listening, time management, public communication, and more – skills valuable throughout their lives.

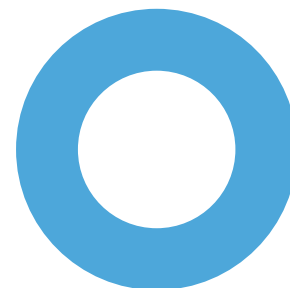

Title: S.T.R.O.N.G. - SHAPE THE REGION OF NEW GENERATION

Venue: Liguria (Italy)

Date: 13th to 27th september 2021

Hosting organization: La Tabacca

The workshop took place in Liguria, Italy, from September 13 to 27, 2021. Participants engaged in activities in the center of Genoa, Genoa Voltri (including the farm “La Tabacca”), and on the west and east shores of Liguria. Due to the main theme of hydrogeological instability, activities occurred in areas affected by extreme events (floods) in recent decades.

Skills acquired included:

Recognition and assessment of issues related to territorial protection

Critical awareness of threats to the local environment

Analysis to evaluate the impact of unauthorized constructions on the territory

Formulation of solutions to minimize impacts and damages

Practical skills for implementing solutions

Evaluation of risks related to the coast, rivers, and streams

Proposal of preventive and corrective measures to mitigate risks

Entrepreneurial skills: identifying opportunities to create businesses to address environmental issues

Knowledge in agriculture and engineering to create business opportunities

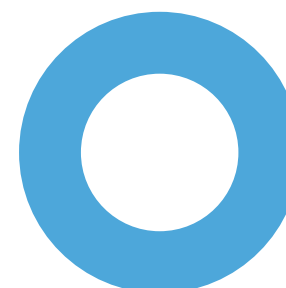


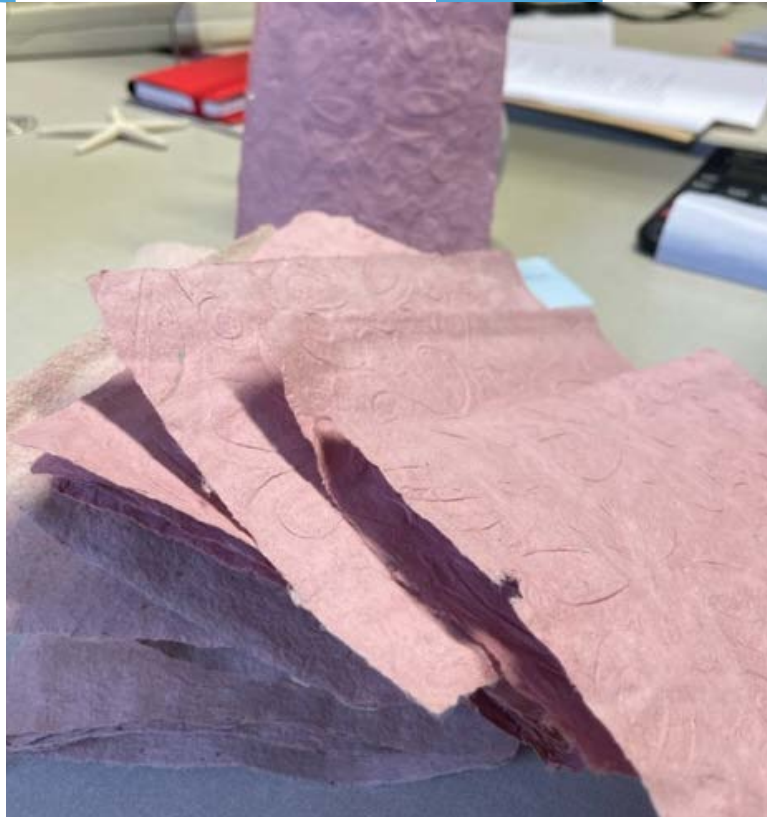

Title: Mapping touristic sites in Bani-Kenanah: Promoting tourism activities in Villages in Northern Jordan.

Venue: Ibrid (Jordan)

Date: 14th to 28th october 2021

Organisation invitée: JUST - UNIVERSITÉ DE JORDANIE POUR LA SCIENCE ET LA TECHNOLOGIE

In Jordan, tourism is concentrated on popular sites like the Dead Sea and Petra, while the rich natural and cultural tourism potential of local communities often goes unnoticed. The Bani-Kenanah region, in northern Jordan, faces this challenge, hosting natural reserves, forests, traditional agricultural practices, and numerous sites of historical and cultural interest. Despite this diversity, tourist activities in the region are limited and often overlooked by both local and international visitors.

Mapping tourist sites is a method to support tourism in local communities and raise awareness of the region's significant natural and cultural heritage. The workshop focused on promoting the tourism potential of six villages in the district: Kharja, Saham, Aqraba, Kofr Som, and Quielbeh.

The workshop aimed to:

Raise public awareness of cultural and natural heritage sites in Bani-Kenanah to increase tourism activities

Learn and participate in the process of identifying natural and cultural heritage resources for conservation and development

Enhance the role of local community organizations in promoting cultural and natural heritage sites

Participants visited tourist sites, interacted with the local population on rural tourism challenges, and developed preliminary **action plans** to help rural communities develop their tourism potential.

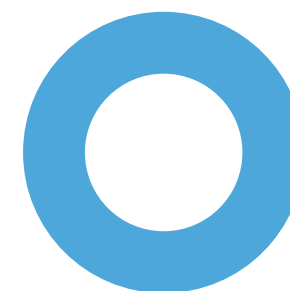

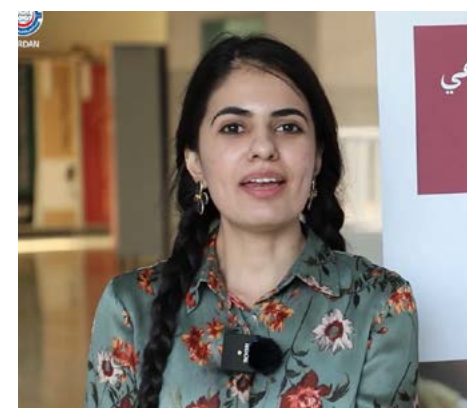

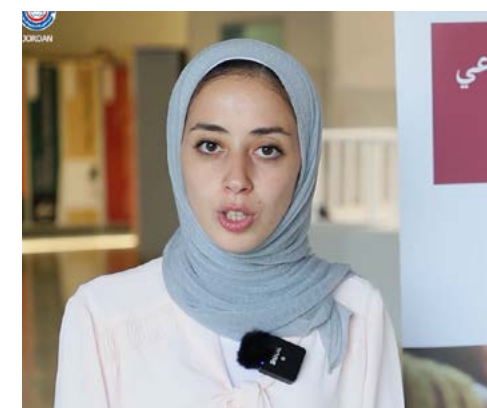

Title: Valuing Cultural Identity and Natural Heritage in the Villages of Tyr Caza

Venue: Villages of Tyre Caza (Lebanon)

Date: 4th to 17th november 2021

Hosting organization: ADR - Association for the development of Rural Capacities

The international training workshop titled “Valuing Cultural Identity and Natural Heritage in the Villages of Tyr and Caza” took place in Tyr, Lebanon, from November 4 to 17, 2021. Twelve young NEETs (individuals aged 18 to 30 without employment, education, or training) from the Mediterranean region participated. Nine participants were Lebanese from different regions, two from Jordan, and one from Tunisia.

The workshop had three phases:

Introduction and training phase, where NEETs were supported by tourism and rural development experts to familiarize themselves with responsible tourism concepts and tools for fieldwork
Fieldwork phase, where participants visited various villages in the Tyr Caza region to identify hidden and recognized places to include in the responsible tourism itinerary
Preparation phase for an itinerary of cultural and natural sites in the Tyr Caza region

“**All around Tyre**” is the itinerary of cultural and natural points of interest produced by the 12 NEETs, helping visitors discover hidden places of cultural, natural, and spiritual interest in the region while providing ecological tips for responsible tourism.

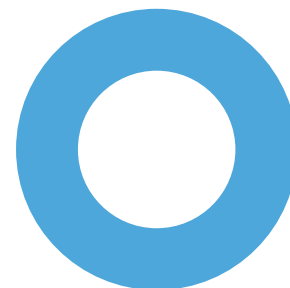

Title: Design of a discovery tour of the Hammamet International Cultural Centre

Venue: Hammamet (Tunisia)

Date: 7th to 21st novembre 2021

Hosting organization: AERE - Association d'Education Relative à l'Environnement

The workshop "Designing a Discovery Tour of the International Cultural Center of Hammamet" aligns with the center's goal to connect with its surroundings, establish partnerships with the active local civil society in arts, culture, environment, and youth, and transform the center's park into an Eco-Park open to residents, tourists, and visitors, promoting ecotourism, cultural tourism, and environmental awareness and sustainability. The objective was to respect the spirit and authenticity of the site with its architectural, natural, and heritage specificities.

After visiting the site, young participants met with local experts in landscape, environment, architecture, arts, communication, museography, etc., to further understand the space. Proposed rehabilitation ideas were presented publicly to local community representatives, local associations, the municipality, and technical and financial partners.

The result of this workshop is a **guided tour and the different stations** (buildings and natural spaces) along with proposals for enhancement. Additionally, awareness tools were created to allow visitors to discover or rediscover the various spaces of the site and better understand its natural, cultural, and heritage richness.

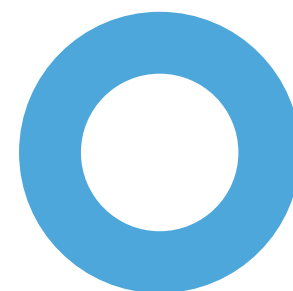

Title: The Former Water Route

Venue: Malemort du Comtat (France)

Date: 14th novembre to 28th novembre 202

Hosting organization: Union APARE-CME

The workshop is located in the municipality of Malemort-du-Comtat, in the Vaucluse department in France. The group focused on the local water heritage to address the question of how to restore hydraulic heritage for the use of residents in a context prone to frequent droughts. The group started by exploring local geography and geology through artistic expression activities.

Numerous field visits were conducted to discover different techniques for water collection, transport, and storage traditionally used, as well as waterless construction techniques like dry stone.

Finally, participants were involved in the restoration and topographic survey of two irrigation reservoirs and their rainwater collection system. The group created an **explanatory panel project** on water wells and educational projects.

A public presentation of the workshop took place in the presence of local authorities and village residents.

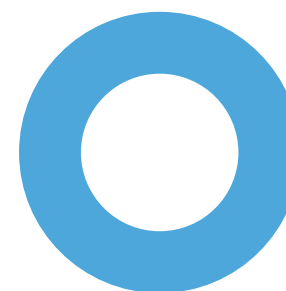

**Title: Conservation of a natural wetland sensitive to pollution
(RAMSAR site and IBA Sebkhet Soliman)**

Venue: Soliman Lagoon (Tunisia)

Date: 7th to 22nd february 2022

**Hosting organization: ISSTE - INSTITUT SUPÉRIEUR DES
SCIENCES ET TECHNOLOGIES DE L'ENVIRONNEMENT**

The Sebkhet Soliman lagoon consists of sandy expanses and dunes. Besides being a nesting place for bird populations, it serves as a refuge for species whose original habitats have disappeared. It is one of the few places in the region that retains water throughout the summer, holding national and international importance as a significant habitat for water birds. Designated as a RAMSAR site (International Treaty on Wetlands) since 2007 and a ZICO (Important Bird and Biodiversity Area) since 2008, the Soliman lagoon faces considerable economic and environmental pressures.

The workshop aimed to raise awareness among young people about nature preservation, specifically focusing on the Sebkhet Soliman site. Experts presented information about the lagoon, its characteristics, and the participants visited the site. The workshop included the creation of awareness panels and highlighted the significance of the Alfa plant in local ecology, promoting its utilization for crafts such as baskets. Additionally, a paper recycling workshop was conducted.

Participants acquired essential skills in conservation techniques, sustainable management, valorization, and maintenance of a sensitive and protected natural environment. They also developed skills in creating solutions and tools for mediation with stakeholders, along with communication, teamwork, and co-construction skills.

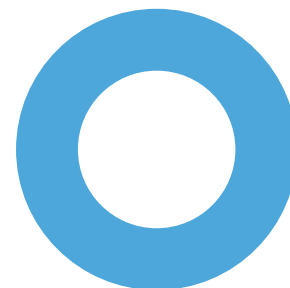

Title: Exploring Ecology in Kfarsir and surrounding villages

Venue: Kfarsir (Lebanon)

Date: 12nd to 25th march 2022

Hosting organization: ADR - Association for the development of Rural Capacities

The international workshop “Biodiversity Exploration in Kfarsir and Surrounding Villages” took place in Kfarsir, Lebanon, from March 12 to 25, 2022. Twelve young NEETs from the Mediterranean region participated. All participants belonged to the NEET category (individuals aged 18 to 30 without employment, education, or training), with 8 participants from different regions of Lebanon and 4 from Jordan.

The workshop comprised three phases:

- An introductory and training phase where NEETs received support from environmental and ethnobotanical experts and were informed about tools for fieldwork.
- A fieldwork phase where participants collected plants along the Litani River, one of Lebanon's main water sources, and gathered information on how local residents used these plants.
- The final phase involved preparing a brochure on the correct use of plants by local residents and organizing an awareness day for students from public schools in Kfarsir and surrounding villages.

“Biodiversity in Kfarsir and Surrounding Villages” is a brochure produced by the 12 NEETs at the end of the practical field training workshop, providing information on ethnobotany and various plant species recognized during fieldwork and how they are used by residents.

Title: Accessibility Assessment of Public Spaces In Jordan

Lieu: Irbid (Jordan)

Date: 23th july to 5th august 2022

Hosting organization: Jordan University of Science and Technology in partnership with JUST-ABLE.

The Jordan University of Science and Technology is one of Jordan's largest universities and the country's first university, located in northern Jordan in Irbid. The RESMYLE and JUST-Able team, consisting of professors and members from the school of architecture and design, the faculty of applied medical sciences, and the innovation center, aimed to address the limited participation of people with disabilities and their families in society due to the lack of accessibility in public buildings, clinics, restaurants, stores, sports facilities, parks, and events. The workshop focused on creating awareness and knowledge about accessibility, advocating for the evaluation of accessibility, and introducing the right tools for assessment. Establishing a database of accessible places enabled people with disabilities and their families to identify accessible locations and increase their social participation.

The workshop aimed to:

- Provide general knowledge about disability and accessibility, formulating meaningful experiences for people with disabilities (PWD).
- Promote awareness of the rights of PWD and the obstacles they face in Jordan.
- Understand disability education and create an inclusive environment for PWD.

- Promote the inclusion of as many individuals as possible in the environment.
- Strengthen evidence-based knowledge.

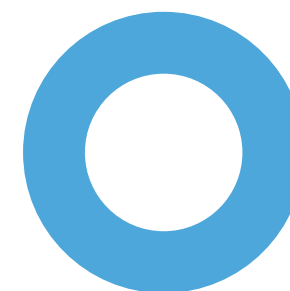

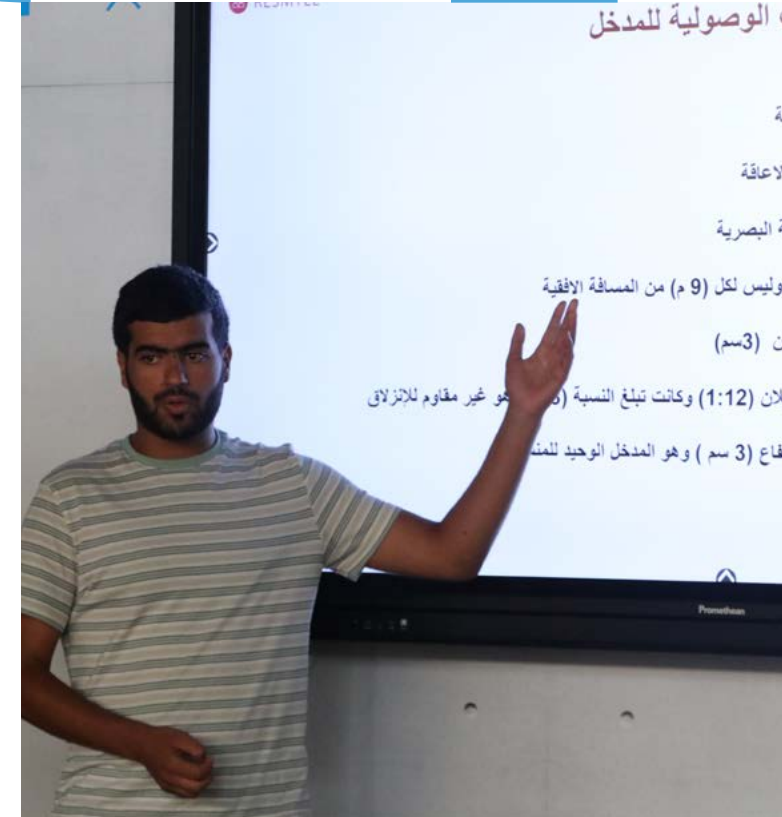

Title: Creating a cultural and touristic circuit in the Medina of Hammamet

Venue: Hammamet (Tunisia)

Date: 22nd February to 8th March 2023

Hosting organization: AERE - Association d'Education Relative à l'Environnement

The third workshop organized by the Association for Environmental Education (AERE) in Hammamet brought together 11 participants from different nationalities, including France, Lebanon, Jordan, and Tunisia: Jawaher, Manel, Tuleen, Abdallah, Mahmoud, Sofiene, Emna, Khaled, Mourad, Sarah. Additionally, two volunteers, Alia and Alexandra, contributed to the success of this workshop.

The main objective of this workshop was to contribute to the promotion of cultural tourism in the city of Hammamet. This goal was achieved by facilitating the exploration and understanding of the material and immaterial heritage of the Medina of Hammamet. It also involved raising awareness among local residents about the opportunities and obstacles related to heritage tourism in the region and providing practical resources for the effective promotion of the Medina of Hammamet's heritage to tourists.

The workshop unfolded in three main phases:

- The first phase was the immersion phase, allowing participants to immerse themselves in the city's context, meet residents and experts, clarify workshop goals and expected outcomes, and understand the working method and tools for achieving the desired results.
- The second phase (fieldwork) involved site visits and hands-on activities, broadening participants' perspectives to explore the local site, customs, and culture.
- The final phase was the training and preparation phase for the presentation. This phase focused on producing final results, including creating a **map** highlighting identified circuits, developing a brochure in Arabic, French, and English to present the heritage of the Medina, and producing a video of the proposed visit to the Medina. Additionally, it included conducting a selective inventory of the material and immaterial heritage of the Medina of Hammamet through data collection, documentation, field surveys, and creating inventory sheets. The phase also covered the preparation of heritage-related communication materials such as photos, videos, QR codes, information panels, signage, and maps.



Title: Waste Warriors in Qana Village: Creating Waste Management Game

Venue: Qana (Lebanon)

Date: 28th February to 13th March 2023

Hosting organization: ADR - Association for the development of Rural Capacities

Between February 28 and March 13, 2023, the practical field training workshop “Waste Fighters in the Village of Qana: Creating Waste Management Games” took place in Qana, Lebanon. Twelve young NEETs from the Mediterranean participated, including 8 from Lebanon, 3 from Jordan, and 1 from Tunisia.

The workshop had three phases:

- The introductory and educational phase involved NEETs working with waste management experts and being introduced to board games.
- The fieldwork phase saw participants enjoy collecting information on creating board games, defining their game ideas, and different gaming mechanisms.



Date: 12th march to 26th march 2023

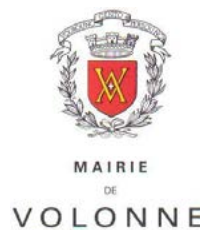
Hosting organization: OPUS

The project is located in the municipality of Volonne, in the Alpes-de-Haute-Provence department in France. The objective of this workshop was to discover the art of “calade” and learn to transmit this knowledge through the construction of a “calade” (stone path) using the traditional dry lime mortar technique. The workshop included creating a brochure on this technique, its construction methods, maintenance, utility, and future (illustrations, photos, writings, layout to be implemented). Two presentation panels on “calade” were installed in the city.

To enrich their knowledge and embrace different traditional approaches, participants discovered various types of “calades” through those built in nearby villages. The **produced works** were presented at a final event with the residents of Volonne.

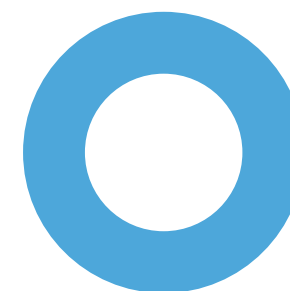

Title: Enhancement and prevention of fire in a natural forest ecosystem “Rimel forest case - Bizerte”

Venue: Bizerte, Forêt Rimel (Tunisia)

Date: 4th to 17th of March 2023

Hosting organization: ISSTE - INSTITUT SUPÉRIEUR DES SCIENCES ET TECHNOLOGIES DE L'ENVIRONNEMENT

Within the two-thousand-hectare Rimel forest ecosystem, rich in biodiversity, 12 young individuals participated in a workshop on its protection and valorization. The objective was to sensitize the youth to the crucial importance of preserving natural ecosystems from a sustainable development perspective.

After a detailed presentation of the site (fauna, flora, etc.), threats to the forest, and their environmental consequences, a collective reflection took place to produce awareness messages for the general public (forest visitors). A controlled fire operation was conducted by firefighters to demonstrate control tools and safety measures.

Finally, the forest valorization part involved participating in plant distillation operations to produce essential oils, candles, etc., and compost production. This part included visits to a cosmetic laboratory and a composting site. Participants gained in-depth knowledge of sustainable forest management, forest ecosystems, and plants. They acquired practical skills in valorizing forest products and transversal skills such as communication, teamwork, public speaking, initiative-taking, and co-construction.

More than just a workshop, this experience is a step towards a future where youth are educated, engaged, and ready to protect our environment. By uniting education, awareness, and concrete actions, we create fertile ground for a sustainable future, where Rimel Forest and its natural treasures thrive for generations to come.

- Day 5** Presentation on the causes of fires and how to fight against them, group work: Collecting information on forest fires around the world and Collecting information on the consequences of fires: discussion of methods of fighting
- Day 6** Cultural visit (Bizerte)
- Day 7** Presentation of fire fighting equipments, Brainstorming to propose control solutions: case simulations in the field, Professionals explain how to extinguish a forest fire? safety measures to follow. White firefighting operation carried out by professionals
- Day 8** Enhancement of forest wealth (distillation of some aromatic plants characteristic of the place), Recovery of forest resources (composting of forest waste to produce value-added compost), Proposal of innovative methods for valuing forest resources
- Day 9** Free day
- Day 10** Plant distillation techniques and Extraction of essential oils (perfumes, pharmaceutical products, etc.)
- Day 11** Practical distillation group work in the laboratory
- Day 12** Valorization of green waste from the forest through the practice of e-composting and recognizing the conditions of this technique, Visit to a composting site, Visit to a cosmetics laboratory

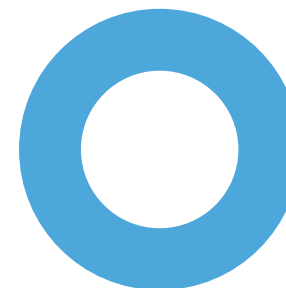

Conclusion

The implementation of the 15 international practical field training workshops has been a remarkable success. Before the launch of these workshops, online training was carefully orchestrated by RESMYLE through the AMESCI Foundation in January 2021 via the training platform, providing essential keys for organizing and ensuring the success of these experiences. The workshops aimed to equip participants with transversal and professional skills.

A total of 179 young people from the five involved countries (France, Italy, Jordan, Lebanon, and Tunisia) participated in these workshops. Their overall satisfaction, both in terms of organization and logistics, the quality of content, and trainers' levels, was high. Their expectations were met, and they highly recommend other young people to engage in similar initiatives.

The workshops were perceived as an opportunity:

- To actively contribute to serving a local development project.
- To gain professional experience using their skills.
